In the 1970's I taught sociology and politics to undergraduate and graduate students at British universities for five years. From 1983 to 1988 I had many engagements in the US to lecture on feminism, militarism, and ecology in a variety of curricular settings including law, peace studies, philosophy, political science, religion, sociology, and women's studies.

#### *Curriculum/Program Development*

At Rutgers, I participated in a New Jersey Department of Higher Education-funded project to revise the Women's Studies introductory course to make it more multicultural. Informally I also worked on a Peace Studies curriculum.

At Colorado College, I developed two new sociology courses: Feminist Perspectives on Leadership; Gendered Cities: Women and the Man-made Environment.

At Antioch, I developed core Women's Studies courses: Feminist Theories, Global Feminisms, Women and Work, and two elective courses: Gay/Lesbian Perspectives, and Gender, Race, Class, and Environmental Movements. I coordinated the Women's Studies Board of Study that oversees the major. I also participated in the development of an Environmental Studies major.

At Hamilton, I developed two new courses: Redefining Security; and Living in Place: Analysis and Strategies for Environmental Citizenship.
